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
5 Antonio Carbajal-Benitez was awarded the DCSW scholarship and is majoring in Electronics Engineering.

In recent years, the College has made significant progress toward establishing an infrastructure that can build the skills of our emerging and existing workforce. In 2006, we took full advantage of those assets:


Our health programs continued to grow in order to address a statewide shortage of healthcare workers. Our computer technology students explored cutting edge software applications in our information technology classrooms and labs.


Community empowerment is something we take very seriously at Aiken Technical College. The College is more than an institution of higher learning; it also serves as a vehicle for sustainable economic development and a provider of strategic vision for the people it serves.

Recognizing the growing popularity of fast pitch softball in Aiken and its surrounding counties, ATC offered a pair of fast-pitch camps for young women athletes in the summer of 2006. An All-Skills Camp designed for young women between the ages of 8 and 13 taught softball basics. It was followed by a more intense Advanced Camp for athletes between the ages of 14 and 18.

Give Kids A Smile, a free day of dental care for children, was held in the clinic of the Health and Science Building during the winter of 2006. "Give Kids A Smile" is a project of the South Carolina Dental Association in coordination with the dental education departments of the technical colleges of South Carolina, the Medical University of South Carolina, and Palmetto Health Hospital. The service provides much-needed dental care to eligible children between the ages of six and seventeen. The project also afforded ATC dental assisting students a valuable service learning opportunity when they volunteered during the clinic.

USC Aiken and ATC together hosted "Martin Luther King, Jr.: Remembering His Dream and Honoring the Man Through Music," at its annual Martin Luther King Day observance. ATC President Dr. Susan A. Winsor and USCA Vice Chancellor of Student Services Dr. Deborah Kladviko served as guest speakers. "Brothers in Christ," featuring Donquell Sims and Aaron Thomson of ATC, and Karen Gordon and Michael King of "Quiet Storm" performed musical selections. Spoken word artist Willie "Alma" Finnie also performed.

The third annual Career Quest came to ATC in the spring of 2006 in the Gregg-Graniteville Student Activities Center. All of Aiken County's middle schools participated, sending hundreds of students to the campus to interview a variety of business, industry and government officials, including representatives of agriculture, architecture and construction, business management and administration, health science, engineering, law and public safety, tourism, government administration, and much more. Students also had the opportunity to explore educational opportunities at ATC and USC Aiken. Career Quest is a project of the Lower Savannah Council of Governments, Public Education Partners, South Carolina Higher Education Awareness Program, Aiken Regional Medical Centers, Aiken County Education and Business Alliance, Kellogg, Washington Savannah River Company, ATC, University of South Carolina, Aiken, and Aiken County Public Schools.





Students in ATC's Massage Therapy Program offered welcome relief to rowers who participated in a spring regatta on Langley Pond. The students had a steady stream of clients all day as tired rowers came off the water. Massage therapy students also offered their skills at other community events, including the ATC Foundation's Friendraiser Golf Tournament.

Leadership Aiken County visited ATC in the spring of 2006 to learn about the campus and how programs here benefit the community. Many participants had never visited the campus before, and were impressed by its size and the diversity of programs offered.

The Aiken Standard newspaper brought home economist Michelle Roberts to ATC to celebrate Taste of Home, a popular cooking school that attracted more than 400 people to the campus in 2006 to enjoy cooking demonstrations, taste samples, and win door prizes.

ATC hosted its third Mathcounts in 2006. Teams from 12 local schools participated in the competition that promotes math excellence among middle school students. Individual and team winners then went on to compete at the state and national level.

The College served as boot camp for more than 30 young adults who participated in the new Aiken Young Marine Program organized by the Aiken Marine Corps League. Participants took part in nine weeks of rigorous survival training while learning military history. The primary intent of the program was to instill discipline in young people who planned to enter the military.

Students of ATC remembered the less fortunate in 2006 with a number of drives, fundraisers and special events. Members of the Student Nurses Association sold pizza, baked goods and drinks in April to raise funds for the Burn Foundation. ATC volunteers, including students, faculty and staff, took part in the National Association of Letter Carriers' Food Drive at the Golden Harvest Food Bank in the spring. College Skills students held a bake sale to raise money for the victims of Hurricane Katrina who were still suffering economic hardships months after the storm. College Skills students also raised money for organizations that aid victims of domestic violence, assisted clients at a local nursing home, and volunteered at a children's shelter.

The Massage Therapy program at ATC expanded its clinical massages to include several popular spa days attended by the public. The spas included Swedish massage, hot rock treatments, salt or sugar scrubs, and paraffin hand dips. Available slots were filled almost as soon as each new spa day was announced.

Working in conjunction with the South Carolina Bar Pro Bono Program, ATC hosted a popular "Law School for Non-Lawyers" in 2006 that featured a number of local attorneys as guest speakers. Topics of the six-week program ranged from real estate and landlord-tenant law to criminal prosecution and defense; juvenile justice to estates and probate; health care and elder care to bankruptcy law.

ATC fielded 80 participants for the American Heart Association's Heart Walk at Aiken Regional Medical Centers in the early spring of 2006. The number of walkers was an institutional best and the College raised \$2,700 for the Heart Association during the event.

Faculty and staff exceeded their goal of raising \$7,000 for the United Way of Aiken County by more than \$1,000 in the fall of 2006. Funds were raised through direct contributions, raffles, pizza sales, and a car wash manned by members of the Executive Staff and ATC basketball and softball players.

Popular caricature artist Steve Gipson visited ATC in the fall of 2006 to draw free cartoon portraits of students, faculty and staff. Mr. Gipson, who bills himself as 'the fastest artists ever,' immortalizes his subjects in pen and ink at lightning speed, and has become a regular visitor to the campus.

Students, faculty and staff gathered around the campus flagpole on the anniversary of 9-11 to remember and pray for those lost in the terrorist attacks that struck New York, Washington and Pennsylvania in 2001. The memorial service was led by F. Gregory Rogers and included prayer and a moment of silence.



aximizing student achievement is our guiding principle. In today's changing economy the need for advanced skills and technical knowledge is essential. We never lose sight of that fact and work to ensure that today's students become tomorrow's success stories.

The ATC Knights men's basketball team clinched the Region 10 regular season championship with a record of 25 and 7 and hosted the District 3 Tournament in the spring of 2006. The tournament included teams from Monroe College of New York, Clinton Junior College of South Carolina, and Allegany College of Maryland, as well as the home team Knights.

Men's basketball Coach Bruce Capers was named the Region 10 Coach of the Year, giving the Knights more to celebrate. Player Christopher (CJ) Martin was named a 2006 NJCAA All-Academic American and a Distinguished Academic All-American.

Recently graduated players also distinguished themselves in 2006. Former Knight Calvin Roland was honored with the inaugural Charles Barkley Scholarship, which is endowed by the 11-time All-Star Hall of Famer. Former Knight Mario Williams then signed to play professional basketball in England for the North Hampton Neptunes.

Dr. Belle S. Wheelan, President of the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, served as keynote speaker during May's graduation ceremony. Dr. Wheelan has also served as President of Northern Virginia Community College — the second largest community college in the nation — and as Secretary of Education to Governor Warner's Cabinet. She is the first African American woman to serve as President of the Commission on Colleges.

ATC also honored its Faculty, Staff and Administrator of the Year during the graduation ceremony. Procurement Specialist Toni Marshall (left) was named Administrator of the Year. With 30 years of purchasing experience in industrial, construction and public procurement, she continually strives to improve the campus' purchasing system and works hard to ensure that items needed on campus arrive in a timely manner. She is a Certified Professional Public Buyer. Ms. Marshall has served as President of the Midland Valley Chamber of Commerce. She has also served on the Leadership Aiken County Board of Directors. Kevin McCarthy (center) of the ATC Maintenance Department was named Professional Support Staff of the Year. An ATC graduate, Mr. McCarthy holds a degree in General Maintenance Technology. He regularly takes additional job-related courses and has obtained basic and advanced certificates in HVAC. He has worked in the ATC maintenance department for seven years. ATC's Engineering and Industrial Division, was named Faculty Member of the year. A dedicated educator of more than 20 years, Mr. Flannagan consistently receives high evaluations from his students. He takes care to continually improve his education and earned his bachelor of science degree and his master's degree in education while he was teaching full-time, serving as an excellent example to his students. Active within the community, he is the President of the Rotary Club of Aiken South. He is also a member of the North American Council of Automotive Teachers.

Entrepreneur Carlos Garcia gave fresh inspiration to ATC's best and brightest during Awards Night in the campus amphitheater. A political refugee from communist Cuba, Mr. Garcia started the RCS Corporation by working out of his living room and built a company that earned him recognition from Entrepreneur Magazine, the US Secretary of Energy, and the Aiken Chamber of Commerce, among others. He is a Board Member of the Aiken County Technical Education Commission.

The Academic Success Center hired director Michelle Price, who instituted new programs, including free study skills workshops that taught students how to study effectively and how to improve their memory skills. A number of new tutors also joined the team, including a volunteer nursing tutor.

In 2006, the College secured an Education and Economic Development Grant that allowed ATC and Aiken County Public Schools to expand the "Pathways Grant," which works with local schools to improve senior students' basic math skills. This expansion includes all Aiken County high schools and provides COMPASS testing to high school seniors who want to remediate deficiencies in math, English and reading while still in high school.

Students Charlene A. Kiraly and Christopher J. Martin were among the technical college students named to the Phi Theta Kappa South Carolina All-USA Academic Team. They were recognized in a ceremony at the State House in Columbia. PTK is the international honor society of two-year colleges. Later in the year, ATC student James Burckhalter was a recipient of the 2006 Phi Theta Kappa National Dean's List Scholarship.



Continuous improvement is central to ATC's education philosophy. By always setting high standards, and, once having achieved those, establishing higher ones, we assure that the College keeps moving forward. The result is a first-rate education for our students.

ATC implemented a Minority Men Earning Degrees (MMEDS) program in 2006 under the leadership of Admissions Director Evelyn Pride-Patterson. The program is designed to increase African-American male enrollment and student retention. Students are recruited from local high schools to attend a special summer bridge program to help them prepare for college level work. Later they are mentored to help them progress through their college educations at ATC.


Faculty and staff took full advantage of in-service training opportunities in 2006, including a workshop on the behavioral outcomes of multi-generational poverty. The ATC Diversity Team hosted a Diversity Workshop that focused on inclusiveness, intrapersonal and interpersonal insight, and skill building. The College also held a Faculty Professional Development Week, which included a speech by Dr. Ronald J. Berk of Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Berk showed faculty how humor can be used as a systematic teaching tool to bring course content to life.

The College undertook its first Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE) that provides information about effective educational practices in community colleges and assists institutions in using that information to promote improvements in student learning and remove barriers that may keep students from continuing their higher education.

ATC completed the reorganization of its Workforce and Business Development Division in 2006, resulting in increased revenue for the College. The Academic Affairs Division also reorganized, resulting in the hiring of Dr. Melissa Denardo, the Vice President of Academic Affairs.

ATC pinned its last LPN class in 2006. The Nursing Department now offers a LPN to ADN Bridge Program that helps Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs) to complete the transition from practical nurse to registered nurse. The first LPN to ADN transition class admitted its first full-time students beginning in the summer of 2006. This class was merged with the fall 2005 ADN students for completion of the ADN program. The second transition class was admitted in the fall of 2006. These students will join the spring 2006 class for completion of the ADN program.





In response to a statewide shortage of health care providers, ATC launched its Associate Degree in Nursing Program in 2005-06. The Associate of Science, Major in Nursing program admitted its first class in the fall of 2005 with 32 full-time students. Full-time students are admitted twice per year, in fall and spring semesters. Two subsequent classes have been admitted thus far, with 32 students beginning in the spring of 2006 and thirty-two students beginning in the fall of 2006. The program required the hiring of additional faculty. A Health and Science Dean, Dr. Alice Frye, was hired as part of this effort.

Nursing faculty also formed an advisory committee in 2006 composed of clinical agency representatives and representatives from the two area BSN programs. This advisory committee provides feedback on curriculum content and quality, assistance in recruitment of faculty and students, selection of equipment, placement of graduates, guest lecturers, arrangements for clinical sites, and other services to this program.

ATC submitted its first accountability report, as required by the South Carolina State Budget and Control Board. All state agencies, including higher education institutions, must submit an annual report under guidelines anchored to the Malcolm Baldrige Award criteria. The report, intended for review by the governor and the general assembly, ensures continuity in college philosophy from year to year. ATC will use to the report to continually review College performance measures and seek improvement where it's necessary.

In preparation for its annual planning process, ATC held a series of listening sessions early in the year with each division of the College. Faculty and staff were encouraged to express their opinions on the many strengths that the College can build upon and the areas that need improvement. Information gathered was used in developing the 2006-07 Annual Plan.

Thanks to a generous gift from the Washington Savannah River Company, ATC installed the same communication software used by many top colleges and universities for student communications. The software, part of the Campus Cruiser CruiserMail Suite, paved the way for online registration, advising, and electronic bill paying, among other features.

Current students expect to be able to do many things online and the College worked to meet this need by completely revamping its Web site. Launched in April, the new www.atc.edu incorporates the most asked for online functions and was designed to be expandable to include new features as they become available. The Web redesign committee was headed up by MPR Director Tom Slizewski and included Walter Busbee, Allyson Davis, Lauren Faulk, Patrick Green, Toni Marshall, Nina Nidiffer and Lynn Weldon.

ATC updated its logo and slogan to better communicate our modern sensibility and emphasize our mission of helping people start achieving their education goals no matter where they are in their lives or careers.

Shortly after the new Web site launched, students, faculty and staff gained access to "My ATC," a web portal that provides a free and secure e-mail account, as well as personal tools such as calendaring, file storage and task management. This was made possible by a plan developed by the Campus Cruiser Project Team, consisting of Hank Arnold, Paul Callahan, Lynn Rickabaugh, Dawn Butts, Lauren Faulk and chairman Rich Weldon.

ATC held an Adjunct Faculty Job Fair in the summer of 2006 in the Community Room of the Health and Science Building. The College recruited for adjunct faculty positions in a variety of program areas in both the Academic and Workforce and Business Development divisions.

Thanks to the Partnerships Among South Carolina Academic Libraries (PASCAL), ATC students gained access to Lexis Nexis in 2006. This incredibly comprehensive database provides full-text documents from more than 5,900 news, business, legal, medical and reference publications with a variety of flexible search options. Among the many available resources are national and regional newspapers, wire services, broadcast transcripts, international news and non-English language sources, business news journals, U.S. Federal and state case law, and much more.

ATC hired Mike Duncan to serve as facilities engineer in 2006. He began implementing new processes, procedures and assessments that ensure that maintenance plans run smoothly and the campus stays in good repair.

Repairs were made on the 900 Building's roof in 2006. The structural work under the canopy was painted and entry-way sidewalks were replaced. Minor repairs were also made inside the building.

Plans were completed for a major renovation of the 100/200 Building that will be completed by the end of 2007. Renovation will begin in early 2007 and include new flooring and ceilings in the classrooms, classroom technology and lighting upgrades, and fresh paint and carpeting.

ATC Today, the campus' bimonthly electronic newsletter launched a new look in 2006. The newsletter is now interactive, in full color, and features personal, motivational stories of

students, faculty and staff, as well as campus news, events and photographs.



Economic development is essential for the creation of jobs and prosperity in our community. It is the reason we continually re-evaluate our programs and align them with the needs of area employers. Maximizing opportunities for our students, business and industry results in increased quality of life for everyone.

An economic impact study released in 2006 confirmed what faculty and staff at ATC have worked so hard to achieve: The presence of the College is one of the primary reasons new and existing businesses invest in the ATC service area. Focus groups results within the study further indicated that two of the top four factors influencing capital investment within the ATC service area included the availability of skilled labor and the quality of worker training programs available through the College's academic offerings and its Workforce and Business Development Division.

The ATC Foundation hosted an annual Joint Chamber Business after Hours in the Health and Science Building. More than 100 guests were treated to a fun reception and fellowship. Massage therapy students were on hand to give guests a chair massage. Attendees were from the three area chambers: Aiken, Midland Valley and North Augusta.

Our Workforce and Business Development Division hosted its eighth annual Business and Industry Luncheon in 2006 to celebrate ATC's partnership with companies throughout the Central Savannah River Area. Dr. Jeffrey M. Stanton, an associate professor in the School of Information Studies at Syracuse University, served as guest speaker. He is the author of *The Visible Employee: Using Workplace Monitoring and Surveillance to Protect Information Assets — Without Compromising Employee Privacy or Trust*.

The Bridgestone Firestone Aiken County Facility received the South Carolina Silver Crescent Award for Manufacturing Excellence in the large manufacturer category in 2006. Established in 2002, the Silver Crescent recognizes outstanding manufacturers in the state based on their economic impact, commitment to the workforce, and involvement and contributions to their communities. The Aiken County plant was nominated for this prestigious award by ATC in recognition of Bridgestone Firestone's strong, continuing support of education and economic development initiatives within the CSRA.

Monsanto generously supported the purchase of two site licenses for a Process Simulation Package in 2006 that will be used by students training in ATC's chemical operations program.





The South Carolina State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education commissioned a study by Omega Associates, LLC, which was completed in December 2005. Its report released in 2006 showed that for fiscal year 2004, state and county funding for ATC totaled \$8.84 million. For every dollar of state or county funds provided ATC, the area received \$11.39 in additional benefits.

ATC joined Community Partners in 2006 to assist the local workforce struggling with the closure of Avondale Mills. ATC, Aiken County Adult Education, the ATC One Stop Career Center, Our Lady of the Valley Catholic Church, the Aiken Housing Authority, and the Lower Savannah Council of Governments worked together to offer courses at ATC, including instruction in automotive technology, construction, retail certification and more. The programs were designed to help displaced workers find gainful employment as quickly as possible. In some cases, financial assistance to further aid displaced workers find training was available through the Lower Savannah Workforce Investment Area's WIA programs.

New tests became available at the ACT Test Center in 2006. Automotive Service Excellence Testing covered such topics as 'auto,' 'collision,' and 'service consultant,' among others. Cosmetology Certification Testing gave cosmetology candidates an opportunity to take the South Carolina State Board of Cosmetology Certification Examinations at a site close to home. And those interested in becoming airport screeners could take the Transportation Security Administration Exam.

Associate Vice President of Workforce and Business Development Dr. Gemma K. Frock served as one of three keynote speakers for the American Association of Women in Community Colleges. At the same conference, WBD's Resource Coordinator Amy Marchant received professional development funds that will help her continue her education.

Dr. Gemma Frock also spoke at the Siemens Conference in 2006. She gave a presentation on chemical operations training at ATC.

DSM Chemical and Shaw Industries created a joint venture in 2006 which will permit the companies to recycle carpeting. ATC joined the effort by training more than 60 operators for the project.

The area's nursing shortage attracted Megan Zaepfel to the program and she plans to work in an area hospital after she graduates in the Spring of 2007.





WBDD held a graduate recognition ceremony in the spring of 2006 to honor the dedication shown by its students. Division VP Dr. Gemma Frock introduced the keynote speaker, Samuel R. Jordan, Workforce Development Administrator with the Lower Savannah Council of Governments.

ATC worked with human resources groups in Augusta in 2006 to identify critical job areas that will soon become vacant as employees retire. The information will become the base of a plan to recruit and train workers who can fill those positions as they become available.

Inspectors Bootcamp, LLC, partnered with ATC to provide fire alarm panel training to a national audience. Two classes attracted students from

across the nation to train in our FAST Lab.


The first Administrative Professionals Seminar and Luncheon was held in the early spring of 2006. The event hosted by the Workforce and Business Development Division featured three speakers, including Ann Taylor, chair of the Taylor Auto Group, and motivational speaker Margie Taylor. John Hart of WJBF Channel 6, served as the master of ceremonies.

ATC's Workforce and Business Development Division held a recognition ceremony in the spring of 2006 to honor the hard work and dedication students displayed as they furthered their careers through training and education. Samuel R. Jordan, Workforce Development Administrator with the Lower Savannah Council of Governments, served as guest speaker. A second ceremony featuring Robby Bowles, administrator of the Carriage Hills Living Center, was held before the 2006 winter holidays.

The Center for Accelerated Technology Training joined with ATC in 2006 to meet a growing demand for welders in the Central Savannah River Area. A non-credit dedicated welding space on the ATC campus now accommodates both aluminum and steel welding. A number of companies, including TTX, BAE, Bridgestone Firestone and Kendall Healthcare have already taken advantage of this program to train their workers in this high demand skill.

Steve Simmons, Director of Sales in the Workforce and Business Development Division, was recognized at the LERN Conference in 2006 for completing his Certified Program Planner in Contract Training. LERN is the national continuing education training organization.

Parsons partnered with ATC in 2006 to run corrosion tests on an air pulse agitator. Information gathered in the tests will assist Parsons as it starts up its new facility at the Savannah River Site.



WBDD hosted a one-day professional development program — Team Creativity, Disney Style — to help area business professionals learn how to foster creativity and everyday innovation in their organizations.



To date the 2006 Drive for Excellence, Annual Giving Fund, has raised more than \$26,000 for the Foundation's Unrestricted Trustee Endowment.

The ATC Foundation held its sixth annual Scholarship Benefactor/Recipient Breakfast in January to recognize the generosity of many scholarship benefactors and introduce them to their scholarship recipients. More than 100 people attended this special event.

The Hospital Auxiliary of Aiken County contributed \$4,000 to the ATC Foundation Scholarship program for students enrolled in radiologic technology, surgical technology, associated degree nursing and dental assisting.

The ATC Employee Giving Campaign was a great success. This year's theme was "Framing the Future for Our Students." The month-long campaign raised awareness of the Foundation's priorities and goals. The ATC Foundation Board of Trustees held a retreat at Misty Lake on October 18, 2006. Seventeen board members gathered to learn more about the college's mission, vision, values and goals and how they will play an integral part in cultivating new donors to the Foundation.

Each year the Foundation allocates \$10,000 toward the faculty/staff professional development. Resources are used to augment ongoing actions or to




