

New Nursing Education Center Planned to Meet Workforce Demand

Aiken Technical College is working toward meeting the growing demand for nursing professionals. With a new Nursing Education Center on the horizon, the College will soon be able to make even more of an impact.

The South Carolina state legislature has allocated \$11.5 million to Aiken Tech from the Savannah River Site Litigation Settlement Fund for the Nursing Education Center capital project. The legislative body also previously designated \$3 million for the facility.

The Nursing Education Center will include auditoriumtype seating for increased classroom capacity, advanced technology, state-of-the-art skills and simulation lab spaces, and additional faculty office space to support program growth. "With a dedicated building, we will have proper classroom space to accommodate larger classes and incorporate simulations and high-fidelity mannequins within the lectures," said School of Nursing Dean Hannah Williams, D.N.P. "This will enhance student learning by allowing them to see disease processes in action with simulated patient responses and feedback."

The College expects the Nursing Education Center capital project to be completed in approximately 2.5 years.

Each semester, the School of Nursing accepts the following:

The Nursing Education Center will provide the space needed to increase the number of students admitted to the College's nursing programs by a projected 69.6% and help the College address the growing nursing shortage.

Aiken Technical College has partnered with Grand Canyon University (GCU) to offer students enrolled in Aiken Tech's Associate in Applied Science Nursing (ADN; RN) degree program a unique pathway to earn a bachelor's degree in nursing (BSN) in a shorter period.

"This is our first signing in South Carolina for the Concurrent Enrollment Program," said GCU University Development Manager Jason Tantrum, MSL, adding that Aiken Tech was eligible for this opportunity due to its nursing graduates' success on the National Council Licensure Examination. "The significance is that not everyone qualifies...you guys are one of three to qualify here in South Carolina, and you were the first to sign this Concurrent Enrollment Program. So we're excited about that."

The RN-BSN concurrent enrollment pathway allows students to begin earning credits toward a bachelor's degree in nursing following their first semester of the ADN program. Participants then continue to take GCU courses during their summer and winter breaks through graduating from Aiken Tech with their Associate in Applied Science Nursing degree.

Participants continue coursework with GCU to complete their bachelor's degree program within nine months after graduating from Aiken Tech.

"We firmly believe in providing our students with a strong foundation, a strong skill set, and a knowledge base that will allow them to transition into the surrounding workforce seamlessly....
We're extremely excited about it as it will set Aiken Technical College apart from others, as well as give our students the opportunity to go out and obtain their dreams and their goals and help meet the needs of our surrounding communities."

"It is an exciting time for the college. Over the past 50 years, the college has made a significant impact by educating minds, changing lives, and enriching communities," said President Forest E. Mahan, Ph.D. "We look to the future of the college and making a difference in our community for another 50 years and beyond. I want to thank the Office of Marketing and Communications team for their leadership on this initiative."

Aiken Tech contracted with World Design Marketing, a marketing firm based in Hilton Head, SC, to develop its new brand and visual identity, including a new logo, slogan, and color palette. The process took about eight months, including research, focus group meetings, and interviews with various stakeholders.

The College's new logo was inspired by an aerial view of the campus to form a shield shape. Inside the shield are two leaning graphical elements that create an upward arrow representing students learning from and leaning on faculty and staff. The background within the shield represents the college and community supporting the efforts of students, faculty, and staff.

Aiken Tech's new slogan, "Uniquely Powerful," represents the strength of the College's educational and workforce training opportunities and how they prepare students for success.

Uniquely Powerful



In fall 2022, Aiken Technical College gained a new Vice President of Academic and Student Affairs and a new Associate Vice President of Enrollment Management and Student Affairs, focused on supporting student success.

The Vice President of Academic and Student Affairs Chad Crumbaker, J.D., said his goal is to ensure that Aiken Technical College is student-ready and supports students throughout their college journey.

"We want to continue building a culture at ATC that is welcoming and inclusive for all and that creates a strong sense of belonging for every student. We'll use our resources to focus attention on developing strong, individualized relationships with students to support the attainment of their college and career goals by creating efficiencies within our processes and systems so that our team can best use its time to connect with and guide our students," Crumbaker said.

Melinda Rodgers, the Associate Vice President of Enrollment Management and Student Affairs, is focused on the student experience, promoting the value of an Aiken Technical College education from a cost-saving perspective, and helping students gain skills that lead to a career. The goal is to increase enrollment by 5 percent every fall semester over the next five years.

"To achieve this goal, my team will work to identify new recruitment strategies, launch a new Customer Relationship Management software and communication plan, improve the student onboarding process, implement a new advisement model, expand student engagement opportunities and increase knowledge of wrap-around services, such as tutoring, coaching, career, wellness for students," Rodgers said.

The expected results from these efforts include increased persistence, retention, completion, and graduation rates that will lead to sustainable enrollment while having fun in the process, Crumbaker added. The College is up 13.3 percent in enrollment in fall 2022 compared to fall 2021. Crumbaker said this is the first enrollment increase the College has experienced in the past several years.

Learning Opportunities Enhanced with New Mock Pharmacy Lab

Aiken Technical College's new mock retail pharmacy lab gives students the opportunity to learn in a realistic setting to better prepare them for their future.

The College's pharmacy

technician program was

established in 2006 and is

accredited by the American

Society of Health-System
Pharmacists in collaboration

with the Accreditation

Council for Pharmacy

Education.

Pharmacy Technician Program Coordinator Lisa Jones said the lab is a valuable learning opportunity for students to apply concepts in a "real-world" pharmacy operation setting.

"Because the roles in this profession are constantly changing, the mock retail lab allows students to be knowledgeable by completing practical labs in order to make the critical mistakes to be learned within an academic environment prior to working in the field. This, in turn, can help students prepare for long-term success in this profession," Jones said.

Some of the key components of the lab include PioneerRx pharmacy software application, an intake area, a pharmacy pick-up and cash-register counter, a stock area, and equipment such as an automated dispensing system, refrigerator, incubator, medication cart, and more. Jones said she hopes the lab experience will help students understand the knowledge and skills needed to assist the pharmacist, including preparing

prescriptions, giving customer support, administrative tasks such as insurance processing, and inventory management, as it relates to federal and state laws.

The lab allows students the opportunity to manage effective communication skills in addition to handling critical thinking, conflict resolution, problem-solving, time and organizational management, active listening, and customer service, all while using teamwork.

"My goal for the mock simulation lab is to be aligned with the programmatic accreditation standards for students as accredited by the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists in collaboration with the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education (ASHP/ACPE)," Jones said.





College Dedicates and Renames Campus Building in Memory of Campus Officer

Aiken Technical College held a private dedication ceremony in March 30, 2022 to formally rename its security building the John E. McCord Campus Security Building.



Apprenticeship Partnership Prepares Students for Careers in Nuclear Industry

Aiken Technical College offers students the opportunity to prepare for careers at three major companies under the Savannah River Site (SRS)— Savannah River Mission Completion (SRMC), Savannah River National Laboratory (SRNL), and Savannah River Nuclear Solutions (SRNS).

The nuclear operator apprenticeship program provides Aiken Tech students with a unique learning opportunity by allowing them to simultaneously receive on-the-job training while completing their required classroom work. During the program, students receive both academic instruction in nuclear fundamentals from Aiken Tech and on-the-job training at SRS.

develop a high-quality workforce to fill their job opportunities," said Aiken Tech President Forest Mahan, Ph.D. "Nuclear fundamentals training opens the door for students to pursue a successful career in a growing industry."

Due to the program's success, the apprenticeship program is expected to expand to serving over 100 students in 2023. Simmons's goals are to expand apprenticeships over the next five to 10 years to assist SRS contractors with their workforce

development needs. He also hopes to expand apprenticeships to include industrial maintenance, lab technician, and machine tool technology positions.

Unique Approach Helps Emergency Medical Technology Students Achieve Success

For the past three years, 100 percent of graduates from Aiken Technical College's emergency medical technology programs have been successfully placed into jobs in the emergency medical services field.

Program Director Jonathan Jones credits the program's flipped classroom format and use of state-of-the art simulation experiences to the program's success.

Students enrolled in the emergency medical technician and paramedic programs complete lectures online and lab activities related to the lectures are conducted in person using high-fidelity, interactive simulations.

Some of the high-fidelity simulation equipment students use as part of their lab experiences include a SimMan 3g that instructors can program to simulate a variety of realistic patient scenarios and a driving simulation that teaches driving safety in emergency situations.

The format provides students an opportunity to be engaged and play an integral part in their learning experience rather than just the recipient of it, said Jones.

"When you teach yourself how to do something, it turns into muscle memory," he said. "You may have seen it. You may have heard people telling you about it. But, when you physically do it, it turns into long-term memory, and you're able to recall it later. It's where the saying, 'it's like riding a bike,' comes from. You don't necessarily forget how to ride a bike; may be a little rusty if you haven't done it in a while, but it comes right back to you. That's the whole premise of what we do in this program."

Student Receives Prestigious New Century Workforce Scholar Award

The American Association of Community Colleges recognized Aiken Technical College student **Ismat Hasan** as a 2022 New Century Workforce Scholar. Hasan is working toward an Associate in Applied Science: Nursing degree at Aiken Tech.

New Century Workforce Scholars are selected based on their academic accomplishments, leadership, activities, and how they extend their intellectual talents beyond the classroom. Over 2,200 students were nominated from more than 1,200 college campuses across the country. Only one New Century Workforce Scholar was selected from each state.

Each scholar also received a \$1,250 scholarship. This scholarship is the first of its kind to support students at associate degree-granting institutions on a national scale as they plan to enter the workforce upon the completion of a degree or certificate. The program is sponsored by The Coca-Cola Foundation and Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society.

Troup graduated in May 2022 from Aiken Tech with an Associate in Arts. She then graduated in June 2022 from Midland Valley High School, earning a 4.0 grade point average and a high school diploma.

Troup enrolled in the College's Early College program at Midland Valley High during her sophomore year to get a head start on her college education.

Aiken Tech taught Troup skills like time-management, organization, and self-discipline, all while balancing high school and college at the same. She described her experience as challenging but rewarding.

Her efforts didn't go unnoticed.

In April 2022, Troup became the first dual enrollment student to receive the Buck Grant Award from Aiken Tech. The Buck Grant Award is the highest academic award and is presented to an academically accomplished graduating student (with a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0) who has the potential to enhance the image of the College upon entry into the work field, or upon continuing their education. The student eligible must have contributed to the College, the community, and be nominated by their department chair or academic coordinator.

"I have been blessed with great professors, and each of my interactions with ATC staff has been pleasant. As a student, the people at Aiken Tech have truly made me feel as though my future is within reach," Troup said.

Troup went on to enroll during the fall 2022 semester at the University of South Carolina- Beaufort with a nursing honors major.
