

The College prepares the annual report to highlight the accomplishments of the past year. The report also reminds us to pause and reflect on our successes and prepare for the upcoming year's wealth of opportunities.

Aiken Technical College's Accreditation Reaffirmed by National Accrediting Association

The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) reaffirmed the accreditation of Aiken Technical College in July 2021 for another 10 years.

"This is a significant milestone for Aiken Technical College, especially as the College approaches its 50th anniversary. This was a campus-wide effort, and I thank everyone involved for their dedication and hard work during this process," said Dr. Forest Mahan, President of Aiken Technical College. "Reaffirmation of Aiken Technical College's accreditation demonstrates that the College is continuing to provide high-quality educational and workforce development opportunities to serve the needs of our students and community."

All institutions accredited by SACSCOC are required to have their accreditation reaffirmed every 10 years to remain in good standing. The reaffirmation process included submission of reports that demonstrated the College's adherence to SACSCOC standards and guidelines as well as an on-site visit held virtually in Fall 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The process also included the launch of the College's new Quality Enhancement Plan, "Read, Write, Achieve," which is focused on improving student reading and writing outcomes and increasing student use of campus reading and writing support services.

College Kick Off Year-Long Celebration for 50th Anniversary

Aiken Technical College employees, students, alumni, retirees, supporters, and community members gathered on September 1, 2021, to kick off a year-long celebration leading to the College's 50th anniversary in September 2022.

Hosted by the ATC Foundation, the event served as the Foundation's annual scholarship fundraiser and raised more than \$30,000 to support the ATC Student Scholarship Fund.

The theme for the upcoming year was also unveiled: "Educating Minds, Changing Lives, Enriching Communities."

Since its founding in 1972, Aiken Technical College has served nearly 52,000 individuals through educational and workforce development opportunities and has awarded more than 16,000 degrees, diplomas, and certificates to over 13,000 alumni.

Other events the College hosted or participated in during Fall 2021 included a Crunchy in the Commons event focused on physical well-being and the annual Out of the Darkness Walk—Aiken.

Aiken Technical College is enhancing its holistic approach to meeting students' needs through its new Success, Wellness, and Growth (S.W.A.G.) initiative.

"The S.W.A.G. initiative continues to strengthen the unity of ATC's students, faculty, and staff and solidify that student success is the true core of ATC," said Crystal Ratliff, Dean of Student Success and Retention. "Students have many personal and academic needs. If we can assist them with as many as possible, then we can help remove barriers that may prohibit them from being successful. Additionally, if we can come to an understanding of our students' needs, with student success in mind, then we should see successful program and course results and graduates who are ready and prepared to enter the workforce."

The initiative, launched in Fall 2021, is being led by the Student Success and Retention division which includes departments ranging from academic tutoring and counseling to the library and student engagement.

Some of the goals of the initiative include increasing campus-wide awareness of services available to students and using data to inform decisions to positively impact student success. Sessions are being held regularly for faculty and staff to share information and ideas to create a cycle of continuous improvement.

Students have been introduced to the S.W.A.G. initiative with increased awareness of available student services and highlighting campus support services with new signage.

Aiken Technical College Contributes to Fighting the Pandemic

When Augusta University Health (AU Health) opened a COVID-19 vaccination clinic on the Aiken Technical College campus, faculty, staff, and students were ready to assist.

The clinic served more than 5,000 area residents from February 3 through May 14, 2021.

Faculty and students from ATC's nursing, patient care technician, and emergency medical services programs collaborated with AU Health personnel on tasks ranging from monitoring vaccine recipients in the observation room to administering vaccines.

"It was a great opportunity for (students) to gain clinical experience with patient interactions and medication administration skills," said Jonathan Jones, Allied Health Department Chair. "It is also important for them to see how numerous organizations can come together and work in unison to support a critical need for the community."

ATC students and alumni working with Aiken Rescue were also present during clinics in case of any medical emergencies. Faculty and students have also assisted with other COVID-19 outreach efforts in the community, including testing and vaccinations, said Dr. Hannah Williams, Dean of Nursing.

"These clinics have primarily allowed our students the ability to connect with and support our community while solidifying the importance of health and wellbeing," said Williams.

The students' contributions will have a lasting impact as they prepare for their careers, she added.

"We hope our students experienced the feeling of joy and satisfaction in knowing that we assisted in such a monumental event to make our world safer, peace in knowing that we helped in potentially saving lives, a deeper connection with our surrounding community, and a strengthened partnership with fellow healthcare facilities and personnel," said Williams.



High School Students Get Early Start Through Enhanced Efforts

Aiken Technical College has continued to increase access to early higher education opportunities for high school students through its Early Start programs.


Early Start, ATC's dual enrollment initiative, is designed to allow qualified and highly motivated students the opportunity to earn college credits while still in high school. Such programs present several benefits, said Melissa Johnson, ATC Director of Strategic Partnerships.

"Beyond the cost- and time-savings, students get an early introduction to the college environment – college-level coursework, campus activities and services, and a community of learners where they can belong. Being able to have this experience makes the transition from high school that much easier and paves the way for future success," said Johnson. "And yes, being able to earn college credits while in high school at a greatly reduced cost is important. Early Start offers a counterpoint to the ongoing concerns about the cost and benefit of college credentials, demonstrating both long and short term benefits for students families, and area workforce development."

For the 2021-2022 academic year, new Early Start offerings include courses being taught on more high school campuses virtually and in-person, an Early Start: Teacher Academy specialty cohort at Aiken High School, and a new career pathway—mechanical and architectural drafting and design. Planning for additional opportunities has begun for the 2022-2023 academic year.

Enrollment in Early Start programs also increased for the Fall 2021 semester.

"It has been exciting to see such a high level of interest in dual enrollment this past year," said Johnson. "We are afforded a wonderful opportunity to re-envision education for area students, to find new and exciting ways to meet their interests. I am thankful for our partners who create these opportunities for us and trust ATC to deliver on the promise of a quality education that opens doors to meaningful career options."



Early College Graduate Achieves Ivy League Dreams

For Stephanie Zaragoza, hard work and determination have helped her achieve her dream of attending Harvard University.

The 18-year-old graduated from Aiken Technical College in May 2021, earning an Associate in Arts degree through the ATC Early College program. The program, provided in partnership with Midland Valley High School (MVHS), offers high school students an opportunity to earn an associate degree while working toward their high school diploma.

She enrolled at Harvard University as of Fall 2021.

"It has been a dream for a long time, since I was 12," said Zaragoza. "I remember my Early College interview. They asked me about my plans after graduation, and I said I wanted to go to an Ivy-league school. Harvard was always the school I wanted to go to."

MVHS students participating in the Early College program begin taking college courses through ATC the summer before starting their sophomore year. It gives them an early and more advanced start compared to their peers, said Fr. Gregory Rogers, ATC Dean of General Education and University Transfer.

The rigor of such a program requires students to handle complex academic subjects and be self-disciplined, mature, and motivated—qualities that Zaragoza showed throughout the program, said Rogers.

"To complete both a high school diploma and an associate degree at the same time shows a high level of capability, character, and persistence," he said. "Further, the graduates are much better prepared to handle the rigor of higher-level academic work than would be the average high school graduate. This is particularly true when the student has demonstrated, as Stephanie has, a high level of academic achievement within the courses she has completed."

While achieving in her courses, Zaragoza still participated in extracurricular activities at MVHS, including the National Honor Society, Beta Club, and the National Spanish Honor Society.

Graduating from ATC and being accepted to Harvard has meant a lot to her family, she said, adding that her parents inspired her to work hard, and she hopes to do the same for her siblings as the oldest of four.

"They've always looked up to me as the oldest, and I wanted to give them something else to look up to," said Zaragoza. "I want to let them know that it is possible to achieve your dreams."

STEPHANIE'S **FUTURE GOALS** Stephanie plans to become a psychologist or psychiatrist. "I want to help with mental health, especially in Hispanic communities, and give back to them," she said.

Aiken Technical College Prepares Next Generation of Surgical Technologists

Aiken Technical College is responding to the healthcare industry's growing needs by promoting its surgical technology program to the associate-degree level starting in Spring 2022.

"Advancements in technology and a rapidly changing environment are requiring Surgical Technologists to have more education to be successful. Programs have to adapt to these demands for professionals in the field," said Yaiza Wade, ATC's Surgical Technology Program Director. "Future graduates will be even more knowledgeable, more marketable, be offered higher salaries and gain skills that are transferable to other professions. Graduates who wish to further their education will have an advantage since they will have more credits that are transferable to a bachelor's degree."

The surgical technology program is a two-year program that trains students to prepare the operating room for procedures, assist surgeons in the operating room, and care for patients after the procedure is complete. Students participate in lab exercises in state-of-the-art facilities on the ATC campus with advanced technologies such as a mock operating room and Syndaver surgical simulators.

Ussery, Margarie Burley, Octavia Hatcher, and Carmen Cabezas participate in a lab activity in the program's mock operating room.

Students also gain clinical experience through partnerships with area medical facilities, including Aiken Regional Medical Centers, Augusta University Health, Children's Hospital of Georgia, Doctor's Hospital, and University Hospital. Students are required to participate in at least 120 operative procedures, including general surgery and specialties such as cardiothoracic, orthopedics, labor and delivery, eye, oral/maxillofacial, and peripheral vascular.

"Surgical Technologists are very important because they are exceptionally skilled and have highly specialized training. They are tasked with safeguarding patients during moments when they are most vulnerable," said Wade. "Their expertise in sterility

and knowledge in a variety of surgical specialties ensure that patients remain safe and receive the best possible care."

ATC FOUNDATION RECEIVES GRANTS TO SUPPORT STUDENTS

Student Microgrants Program: Aiken Technical College was awarded a \$20,000 Dominion Energy Foundation grant to support its new student microgrants program. The ATC Foundation applied on behalf of the College to help students who have completed at least three-quarters of their degree or certificate program but are at risk of stopping out due to financial barriers. Dominion Energy was the first to support the microgrant completion grants program at Aiken Technical College.

Workforce Training: The Bank of America Charitable Foundation awarded the ATC Foundation a \$10,000 grant to support the College's workforce training efforts. The grant has covered the cost of tuition and books for those enrolled in the material handler course offered through ATC's Continuing Education Department.

Veterans Support: The Fluor Foundation's Military Support Coalition awarded the ATC Foundation a \$10,000 grant to fund scholarships that help student veterans with the cost of attendance and living expenses while they are enrolled at the College.

Scholarship Funding: The Gene Haas Foundation awarded a \$6,000 grant to the ATC Foundation to support scholarships for students enrolled in the machine tool program at ATC. The scholarships will be used to assist qualifying students with tuition, books, and supplies.

GOVERNOR COMMITS FUNDING TO SUPPORT WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

South Carolina Governor Henry McMaster announced on November 3, 2021, that he is designating \$17 million from the Governor's Emergency Education Relief Fund for a new Workforce Scholarships for the Future program.

The program will begin in January 2022 and continue until all funds have been used.

The program will cover the tuition and required fees for South Carolina residents enrolled in the state's 16 technical colleges in a major for a high-demand field such as business, computer science and information technology, construction, criminal justice, distribution and logistics, early childhood

education, healthcare, human services, manufacturing, nuclear, and transportation.

The funding is also available to cover the tuition and required fees for qualifying continuing education courses.

In January 2021, Governor McMaster designated funding to the South Carolina Technical College System to provide free short-term job training to help South Carolina residents enter the workforce quickly with in-demand skills. This enabled the College to offer the SC Manufacturing Certified course for free to South Carolina residents interested in working in the manufacturing industry.

COLLEGE RECEIVES PEBA PARTNERS AWARD

Aiken Technical College received the overall **2021 PEBA Partners Award** from the South Carolina Public Employee Benefit Authority.

According to the announcement from SC PEBA, the award recognizes SC state agencies dedicated to "promoting a physically, emotionally and financially healthier workplace."

The College's Employee Wellness Program, led by the Human Resources Office, provides employees with various activities, resources, and personal and professional development opportunities to encourage healthy habits.

Some of the activities have included a virtual walk/ run, a virtual engagement board, virtual meditation, and workshops on saving for the future, stress management, and relaxation techniques.

NEW PATHWAY CREATED TO LAW ENFORCEMENT CAREER

The SC Technical College System and the SC Criminal Justice Academy have partnered to create a new Police Pre-Academy Training Certificate, which offers a unique pathway to a career in law enforcement and addresses the industry's workforce shortage.

Candidates first apply to one of the state's 16 technical colleges and complete a 14-week certificate program where they will learn basic and introductory law enforcement training, tactics, and procedures. Credits earned also count toward an associate degree in criminal justice if candidates decide to further their studies.

Upon completion of the certificate program, candidates must complete the following steps to start their career as a certified law enforcement officer in South Carolina:

- Obtain employment with an SC law enforcement agency within one year
- Pass a cumulative exam and physical assessment through the SC Criminal Justice Academy
- Complete an eight-week training program at the justice academy

Employee Selected for Leadership Role with State Association

One of Aiken Technical College's own is next in line to lead the South Carolina Technical Education Association (SCTEA), a professional organization for employees in the South Carolina Technical College System. Bruce McCord, Director of Institutional Effectiveness, Teaching, and Technology, was selected as the president-elect for SCTEA during its 2021 virtual conference. He will assume the SCTEA president role in February 2022 at the SCTEA annual conference.

SCTEA was founded in 1974 to promote and advance technical education in the state and provide development opportunities for both employees and student leaders.

Prior to this appointment, McCord served as the ATC representative to the SCTEA Board for two years. He was also recognized by the organization in 2009 and 2017 as the SCTEA Faculty Member of the Year for ATC.

He currently serves as the co-chair for the College's Quality Enhancement Plan committee, as coordinator of the ATC Curriculum and Instruction Committee, and is a Grace and Charles Sloan Community College Leadership Alliance Fellow.

He is also serving as a co-chair for the 2022 Lower Central Savannah Region's Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment.
